The area covers from Virginia northward to MD, MV, DEL, EFA and NJ, Included in these maps are digipeaters, Packet Bulletin Board Stations (PBBS), and home stations usually left on for digipeating. Stations running WBRLI compatible software for PBBS, Mailboxes and/or gateways are indicated by the use of the "a" character preceding the call sign. Paths are shown by either the 1 or the / as connecting characters. Unless noted, all VHF routes shown are presently on 145.818 MHz.

Those links which are marked with a question mark (?) indicate a link of unknown reliability. If you have any information concerning known rellability unreliability or non-existence of any links shown on this map please drop me a note.
